

Discover the Historic Chambers Island Lighthouse

A Hidden Gem in the Town of Gibraltar



Nestled on the northern end of Chambers Island, the Chambers Island Lighthouse has stood as a beacon on the Bay of Green Bay since 1868. Originally built to guide ships through these vital waters, the lighthouse and surrounding 30 acres of land were transferred from the U.S. Coast Guard to the Town of Gibraltar in 1975. Since 1976, this scenic and historically rich site has been proudly maintained as one of Gibraltar's public parks.

Open to the public during the summer season, the lighthouse welcomes visitors from mid-May through September, primarily on weekends when caretakers are present. Whether you're a history buff, nature lover, or boating enthusiast, it's a truly unique experience to explore this remote and peaceful landmark.

Planning a Visit?

If you have your own boat, anchor in North Bay and enjoy a ½-mile walk through the island to reach the lighthouse.

Town of Gibraltar Administrator Travis Thyssen Nominated for Governor's Outdoor Industry Award

FISH CREEK, WI – Travis Thyssen, Administrator for the Town of Gibraltar, has been nominated for the prestigious Wisconsin Governor's Outdoor Industry Award in the Trailblazer of the Year category. This award recognizes individuals who have made exceptional contributions to advancing Wisconsin's outdoor recreation industry and raising its profile statewide.

Presented by the Wisconsin Office of Outdoor Recreation, the Governor's Outdoor Industry Awards celebrate the work of leaders, innovators, and advocates whose efforts support one of the state's most vital economic and cultural sectors. The 2025 awards ceremony took place at the Wisconsin Executive Residence on June 26, 2025, as part of Great Outdoors Month. Winners will be announced.

Thyssen's nomination comes in recognition of his leadership in one of Gibraltar's most impactful recent conservation efforts: the acquisition and expansion of Fish Creek Park. Under his guidance, the town successfully acquired the 119-acre Redmann property, growing the park to a total of 152 acres of preserved natural space. The project was funded entirely through grants and private donations, including a notable \$249,000 grant from the Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Program.

The expansion not only protects vital natural resources but also enhances recreational opportunities for residents and visitors. The project aligns closely with the Town of Gibraltar's commitment to sustainable development, outdoor access, and long-term community well-being.

"Travis's vision and leadership have been instrumental in preserving the natural character of Fish Creek while expanding outdoor experiences for all," said a Town official. "His nomination is a reflection of his dedication not just to Gibraltar, but to Wisconsin's broader outdoor future."

All nominees for this year's Outdoor Industry Awards represent the best of Wisconsin's commitment to its natural spaces and recreational legacy.

The Town of Gibraltar proudly congratulates Travis Thyssen on this well-deserved honor.

The Sucker Run: A Welcome Sign of Spring

Most of us who live year round in GibraltarTownship have our favorite harbingers of spring; the call of the Sandhill Crane, the first hepatica blossoms along Shore Road in Peninsula Park, the disappearance of the dirty pile of snow at the end of the driveway. Thanks to the research of Karen Murchie at the Shedd Aquarium, I now have a new one...counting suckers! And I'm not talking lollipops in the bowl next to the bank teller's window. I'm talking FISH \bigcirc

Though an often maligned fish, suckers actually influence an early part of the food chain providing an array of nutrients to trout and other game fish. The nutrients they provide during spring spawning also feed many insects that then become food for the birds who migrate through and make their home here. This has led Karen to study their patterns and behavior, and to develop a citizen science project involving volunteers around the Great Lakes who monitor numerous creeks in anticipation of their arrival.

Here in Fish Creek, a handful of folks take turns going down to the creek each morning in April and early May. Some of you may have noticed one of us standing on the "bridge" near Fish Creek Park in our polarized glasses peering expectantly into the water.

Or perhaps doing a little "happy dance", or giving a cheer as we spot our first sucker of the year, or see one of them successfully making its way over the concrete lip of the culvert and heading upstream.

To be honest, there is the occasional damp, cold morning when I have to push myself to gear up for standing around at the Creek for 10 to 15 minutes. And despite the fact that there is often a week or two before we see any sucker action, my morning trip is always rewarded....a pair of snowy egrets or a bald Eagle flying overhead, my first Robin of the year, or a pleasant chat with one of the morning walkers. One morning this year I was in my spot for a good two minutes before I noticed a heron standing in the shadow at the edge of the creek not 30 feet from where I stood. It remained for as long as I did, which was longer than the usual 10 minutes as I was certain it was waiting to catch its breakfast and hoped that meant the suckers were arriving. I didn't see a sucker that morning, but two days later I spotted one. Always a cause for celebration.

As their numbers increase, the fun increases. It can be a challenge to count those suckers! But once one gets accustomed to their shape under the water, the places in the Creek they like to gather, and the splashing they create when spawning, it gets easier.

The town received a grant to install a **fish ladder** that makes the journey easier for most of the fish. Oddly enough, a number of fish still choose to do it the hard way. When the creek is low, as it was this year, they really have to work and it's impressive to watch their effort.

Karen obtained a grant to tag some of the fish from each creek and it turns out some of the tagged fish returned to Fish Creek this year. Her research is providing other valuable information about their patterns and behavior. She gives a few very interesting programs in the county each spring if you'd like to learn more, or perhaps want to join her team.

Our little namesake Creek is a beautiful and fascinating place and its health is important to our environment, especially in light of the increasing impact of development in our town.

Those of us counting suckers are also part of the Fish Creek Watershed Committee which monitors the condition and health of the creek. It, too, is a relatively easy task that involves visiting the creek once a month, May through October, to measure its flow, clarity, temperature; and twice a year an invertebrate study to see what critters are living there. It only requires a few hours of time, though there is a short hike and sometimes a bit of scrambling for a few of us.

We are a very small committee and could use a few more members.

Celebrating 150 Years of the Alexander Noble House

Preserving History at the Heart of Fish Creek

This year, we proudly celebrate the 150th anniversary of the Alexander Noble House, a cornerstone of Fish Creek's rich heritage and a true testament to the power of community.

Nearly three decades ago, this historic home was on the verge of being lost to the highest bidder. But thanks to the determination and passion of local residents, the Gibraltar Historical Association (GHA) and supporters banded together to save, restore, and preserve the Noble House. What followed were countless hours dedicated to bringing the home back to its original appearance—an extraordinary example of what collective action can achieve.

Why preserve the Noble House? Because it's a living time capsule. Inside, you'll find original kerosene lamps, chairs, photos, windows, wooden floors, beadboard walls-even a vintage organ. It's a rare opportunity to step inside a home that

has remained largely unchanged since Fish Creek's earliest days. And it's more than just a building—it's the legacy of Alexander Noble, a founding father, town blacksmith, postmaster, and leader in both local and county government.

We are especially grateful for the Town of Gibraltar's continued partnership, including recent work to repair the home's foundation. GHA is also busy restoring worn porch floorboards to ensure the home remains safe and beautiful for years to come.

Preservation is more than repair—it's a commitment to honoring and maintaining the stories, spirit, and structures of our past. The Noble House is not just a building; it's a historical landmark, a community victory, and a symbol of shared heritage.

We invite you to join us in celebrating this incredible milestone—150 years of the Alexander Noble House—and to continue supporting the preservation of this beloved piece of Fish Creek history.
