

### Mosquito Control: What You Need to Know

A Note from the Parks & Lands Committee

**Municipalities sometimes use Ultra Low Volume (ULV)** applications to reduce mosquito populations. These treatments involve spraying tiny droplets of insecticide from trucks or aircraft, usually after dark when mosquitoes are most active. ULV applications act as a quick "knockdown" with minimal residual effect and, according to research, have only short-lived and minor impacts on most non-target insects.


However, in Wisconsin, ULV treatments are rare. Instead, many homeowners and pest services use "barrier" or "residual" treatments, which apply insecticide (often pyrethroids) to vegetation around yards and structures. These treatments can last for weeks and are broad-spectrum, meaning they can affect many other insects—not just mosquitoes.

Studies show potential risks:

- Monarch caterpillars harmed up to 3 weeks after spraying
- Honey bees affected 28 days post-treatment

Because these treatments are often applied monthly, there are concerns for pollinators and other beneficial insects like butterflies, fireflies, moths, and bees. More research is needed to understand the full impact.

# Fire Prevention Week: October 5-11, 2025

The focus is on raising awareness about the safe use of lithium-ion batteries—common in phones, laptops, e-bikes, and more. Key safety tips include:

- Research products before you buy.
- Always use the manufacturer's cables for charging.
- Follow safety guidelines for charging and disposal to prevent fires or explosions.

The campaign, led by the NFPA (National Fire Protection Association), emphasizes the importance of proper handling to keep your home and family safe.

# **Parks and Lands Update**

The Town of Gibraltar Parks and Lands Committee remains dedicated to providing and maintaining spaces for both residents and visitors to enjoy. Our parks, open areas, two cemeteries, and volleyball courts are located throughout the village, offering opportunities for recreation, reflection, and community use.

#### 2025 - Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (CORP)

This year, the Committee has undertaken the development of a Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (CORP) to guide the long-term vision and management of community parks and public spaces.

- **Spring 2025** A community needs survey was distributed and completed, providing valuable input regarding current and future recreational needs.
- **Fall 2025** A draft of the CORP will be completed and made available for public review and comment. Community feedback will be incorporated before final adoption.

The CORP will serve as a framework for ensuring that Gibraltar's public spaces remain responsive to community needs and priorities.

#### 2025 - Major Projects in Development

Two significant initiatives are currently under discussion and planning:

- Waterfront Park Development Concept planning is underway for a new waterfront park to expand public access and recreational opportunities.
- Fish Creek Park Work is in progress to significantly increase amenities of Fish Creek Park.

#### Both projects are being coordinated closely with the Town Board and will emphasize:

- Sustainability and stewardship of natural resources
- · Public education and interpretive opportunities
- Accessibility for all residents and visitors
- · Long-term maintenance and best management practices

These efforts are intended to create durable, high-quality public assets that reflect the community's values and priorities.

#### **Future Initiatives – Community Support and Contributions**

The Committee extends its appreciation to all individuals and organizations who have contributed to benches, restoration work, and beautification projects. Community support remains an essential part of maintaining and enhancing Gibraltar's parks and lands.



**Looking ahead**, the Committee plans to add American flags in observance of Memorial Day and Independence Day for the future. Donations are being sought to support this initiative, along with other beautification and restoration projects.

## **Ephraim-Gibraltar Airport Highlights for 2025**

#### **ANNUAL EAA YOUNG EAGLES DAY:**

The Summer of 2025 was kicked off with the annual EAA Young Eagles Day conducted by the Friends of the Ephraim-Gibraltar Airport and hosted by the Sturgeon Bay EAA chapter the first Saturday in June. We had 69 kids 8-17 years old take to the skies, some for the first time and probably a life-long memory for all of them. It has become a real community event with aircraft displays by those who have hangars here, the Fire/Rescue and Police, and the Civil Air Patrol Squadron from Sturgeon Bay, along with lunch provided by Alexander's. We had a set flight path with orderly departures and arrivals, lots of communication, and careful planning by all of the pilots and ground support volunteers who make this possible for so many Door County youth.

#### PRIVATE PILOT'S LICENSE SPONSORSHIPS:

We have also recently approved another northern Door County high school graduate for our Sponsorship program to support them in obtaining their Private Pilot's License. Over the years, the Friends have supported:

- ·Four local kids attending EAA Camp (two of which are now working in Airport Management and the Air Force),
- ·Five youth who received flight training (two of which are now Commercial pilots and one just starting), and
- ·Four who have received yearly Scholarships to support obtaining degrees or certifications in the aviation industry (two pilots as above and one pursuing a career as an Airframe and Powerplant / Electronics expert.)

#### **MEMORIAL FUND:**

Earlier this year, a longstanding leader and contributor to this airport, Jon Neville, passed away and the Friends have collected a memorial fund in his honor. From these funds, we have put in a new flagpole and flag and are planning to install a memorial brick patio to remember Jon and others who have brought this Airport to where we are now. Jon and our current Airport Commission chairperson, Marty Franke, were instrumental in making this Airport financially independent for all operations, and the Friends continue to volunteer their time and financial support to this Airport and through it, the broader community.

#### **NEW HANGERS:**

Some will notice that we have cleared a lot next to the existing main entrance, and this is where five new hangars will be built to begin to address the longstanding Waiting List for these hangars. Nearly all of the current hangar owners also own homes and businesses here, and the contribution of this Airport to the northern Door County community continues to be significant.

#### **AIRPORT MASTER PLAN:**

Since the Airport was opened in 1946, it has provided an alternate form of transportation to and from here for individuals and businesses and continues to be an integral part of the State and Federal transportation network. The Airport continues to receive significant support from the Federal and State governments to continue to provide services to the public, and we have launched the preparation of an Airport Master Plan (with the WI Bureau of Aeronautics) to define needs in the future to keep this Airport a safe and open resource in the future. This is planned to be completed in 2026. One service that is important to all of us is this Airport's role in Door County Emergency Services, with emergency air ambulances (Flight for Life) coming here regularly – there were seven (7) flights in 2024 and six (6) so far in 2025, with the most recent last Wednesday the 17<sup>th</sup>, just as we completed our monthly Friends meeting!

#### **ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION:**

Next year will be the 80<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Ephraim-Gibraltar Airport, and we have decided to combine our Anniversary Celebration with our next EAA Young Eagles Day. We wish to invite everyone from the community to come to this "Open House" and learn more about the history, contributions and future plans, as well as meet those who keep this Airport running as a safe and welcoming destination.

#### **Chairman's Letter**

Well, even though a heat wave has arrived, signs of Fall are upon us. Weekday traffic has subsided a bit, aside from the County A traffic due to the Highway 57 detour. I hope everyone had a chance to enjoy the summer and enjoy a couple of the wonderful music events in the Town.

Islandview blacktopping was completed, and other road repair, crack filling and micro sealing will start in the next month.

As the seasons change the Town Board and staff will start looking at Fall projects, issues that need addressing, and preparing next year's budget. The fall ditch mowing is being completed and tree trimming in the rural areas will begin. Discussions continue with GHA's request to lease and maintain the old Kinsey home, the future street plans for the old downtown, and the Harbor Commission's plans for updating the docks and marina. Over the off season we hope to finalize the plans for the waterfront/marina parking lot and the new park addition, with collaboration from the Parks Committee and Harbor Commission, pulling together the high-level plans that were approved and creating a final construction plan. The Town continues to apply for grants and ask for donations to help fund these projects to help reduce the burden on our Town taxpayers.

The Town Board just returned from our Chambers Island Road & Building review, and we were very impressed with the Lighthouse exterior painting that was done, as well as the new solar panel power system. Thanks to our lighthouse keepers and generous donations, the lighthouse is finally getting the TLC it has needed for a long time. I invite you to go check it out!

Thank you to all those that have donated for various projects in our Town, big or small, they all add up.

Lastly, I mention, the Town Advocacy Committee in Madison, of which I have been a member for the last 2 years, and for which I was elected president in August. Under the Wisconsin Towns Association, the Committee's job is lobbying for increased aid for Towns in Wisconsin, legislation that helps and benefits towns, as well as opposing legislation that hurts the Towns. This Committee was instrumental in the last 2 years in bringing a substantial shared revenue increase, and additional road aid to our town, and all towns in the state. I continue to work to help our little town in every way I can, as many of us do.
